MLA Documentation System—Quick Guide

The MLA documentation system consists of two parts:

- **1.** Parenthetical Citations—At the end of each passage in the text that requires documentation, insert the last name of the author and the page number (if available) in parentheses.
 - The citation follows the last word of the passage (or the closing quotation marks) and comes before the final punctuation:

The new law would be an effective solution to the problem (Jones 234). "These factors will no longer be an issue" (Jones 235).

• If the name of the author is introduced in the text of the paper, it's deleted from the citation to avoid unnecessary repetition:

Jones has a similar view of the problem; he believes the new law would be an appropriate solution (223).

• If the author of the source is unknown, the citation consists of the title (abbreviated if necessary) and the page number:

The situation has changed considerably ("Surprising Solution" 8).

2. Works Cited Page: At the end of the paper a complete bibliographical entry is provided for each source. These entries are arranged alphabetically on a separate page under the heading **Works Cited.** This page should be double-spaced with reverse indentation (see the examples below taken from *MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers, The Little Seagull Handbook*, and *The Purdue OWL*).

Examples of Works Cited page entries for common online sources

Information required for citing works from websites:

- 1 Last name of author, First name (if available).
- 2 "Title of the Section or Article."
- 3 Title of Website (referred to by MLA as a "container"),
- 4 Publisher of the Site (if the publisher is the same as the title of the website, only list it once),
- 5 Date of publication (if available),
- 6 URL.
- 7 Date of access (optional but usually recommended).

(<u>Note</u>: The periodical title, volume, number, date, pages, and doi [digital object identifier] can usually be found at the beginning of the article. If no doi is provided, use the URL.)
