8. Explanation of the Change:

We request a name change for the program from Criminal Justice to Criminology and Criminology Justice to better reflect the scope and focus of the degree. Renaming the AA to Criminology and Criminal Justice (CCJ) reflects current academic and professional standards. Across higher education, CCJ has become the widely recognized acronym/program name, signaling the study not only of the justice system but also the social, psychological, and cultural causes of crime focusing more on understanding criminal behavior, societal responses, and prevention strategies. This broader scope strengthens the degree's appeal to students, enhances clarity for graduate schools and employers, and reflects the language most commonly adopted in the field today.

CCJ is an established acronym in the discipline—appearing in major associations, research journals, and degree programs. Using CCJ ensures our program is both recognizable and competitive in today's academic and professional landscape, while also aligning with the intent of our program offerings and the areas of faculty expertise.

Rather than indicating that students may select "any CJUS prefix course numbered 300-492," we have explicitly listed each CJUS course in this range. This approach highlights the breadth of our course offerings

when students access our program webpage, providing students with clearer guidance rather than requiring them to investigate the prefix range on their own by searching our course catalog.

We have removed POLS 210 Public Administration because it is no longer regularly offered at NSU. In its place, we have added POLS 100 American Government as an elective option. This course is well-suited to the program and also fulfills the SGR #3 Civics Requirement, allowing students to meet both the general education requirement and a program elective with a single course.

Additionally, we are submitting two New Course Requests (CJUS 443 and CJUS 444) along with this Substantive Program Modification. These requests outline the rationale for the new courses and explain how they will enhance the overall curriculum.
