8. Explanation of the Change:

The BSEd in Secondary Education curriculum has been updated, and corresponding revisions are being made to the BSEd in Social Science to ensure consistency and alignment. Specifically, the program is being revised by:

- Adding SEED 420 as a methods course (replacing SEED 400)
- Removing EDER 415 and ELRN 435
- Replacing an outdated SEED 450 with SEED 460
- Allowing students the option to take INED 211
- Reducing the credit hours for SEED 488 from 8 to 6

These adjustments align the BSEd in Social Science with the BSEd in Secondary Education and reflect recent curriculum updates. The revisions provide a more streamlined course of study by removing redundancies, updating course requirements, and offering greater flexibility through the option of INED 211. In addition, reducing the credit load for SEED 488 lessens the overall burden on students while maintaining the rigor and integrity of the program. Collectively, these changes support program coherence, efficiency, and student success.

Furthermore, upon review by the department, it was confirmed that assessment instruction and instructional design are already embedded across numerous education courses, ensuring these critical areas remain well integrated into the program.

14. Describe the real impact to students.

The real impact to students is a more efficient and consistent pathway to degree completion. By aligning the BSEd in Social Science curriculum with recent updates to the BSEd in Secondary Education curriculum, students benefit from reduced duplication of content, a streamlined course sequence, and greater clarity in program requirements. The reduction of SEED 488 from 8 to 6 credits decreases overall credit load without diminishing program quality, making the degree more affordable and achievable within four years. The addition of SEED 420 and the option of INED 211 also provide students with relevant methods training and flexibility in fulfilling requirements, better preparing them for licensure and classroom success

15. Describe the real impact to the university.

The real impact to the university is strengthened curricular consistency and operational efficiency. Aligning the Social Science program with the broader Secondary Education curriculum ensures coherence across degree pathways, which simplifies advising, supports accreditation compliance, and enhances the university's ability to clearly communicate program expectations. Because faculty are already teaching the revised courses, no additional staffing or resources are required, allowing the university to implement these changes with minimal disruption. Additionally, streamlining SEED 488 from 8 to 6 credits reflects a commitment to affordability and timely graduation, which positively impacts recruitment, retention, and the university's reputation for delivering high-quality teacher preparation programs.
